115	Forces have been vital in maintaining the freedoms and ways of life that we enjoy in our local

118	WHEREAS, Operation Green Light is a nationwide initiative to support veterans and raise

168 169 170 171 172 173	<b>WHEREAS</b> , Braxton Dunkin Foushee, around the age of 15 years, became part of a voter registration project and worked with Ms. Rebecca Clark to escort and protect older Black citizens to register to vote in Carrboro; prior to their involvement, citizens of Carrboro had to guess how many jellybeans were in a jar in order to register, following a national pattern of voter disenfranchisement; and
174 175 176	<b>WHEREAS</b> , in 1961, Braxton Dunkin Foushee began to work with the local labor movement in Carrboro and Chapel Hill, advocating for equal pay and fair treatment for Black residents; and
177 178 179	<b>WHEREAS</b> , in 1969, Braxton Dunkin Foushee became the first Black member of the Carrboro Town Council (then known as the Board of Aldermen) and served until 1981; and

180 181	<b>WHEREAS</b> , Braxton Dunkin Foushee championed many issues which impacted the Black community in Carrboro, including ensuring equitable access to paved roads, sidewalks, and
182	bicycle infrastructure for the Black residents of Carrboro; and
183	bleyele illitustructure for the Black residents of Carrooto, and
184	WHEREAS, Braxton Dunkin Foushee worked tirelessly to fight injustices against Black
185	residents by law enforcement in the 1970s, resulting in state agencies investigating and
186	diversifying the Carrboro Police Department in the late 1970s; and
187	diversitying the entropie reflectment in the face 1970s, and
188	WHEREAS, Braxton Dunkin Foushee has dedicated over 54 years of his life to continuous
189	service, as an elected official, a member of a town advisory board, and a community leader;

192	thanks Braxton D. Foushee for his tremendous service to the Town of Carrboro.

Mayor Seils responded with it was an issue of defining the parameters, so they used broader terms like zoning districts instead of proximity to transit. Spoke about being less presumptive and more determinative. Is sympathetic to the idea of being bolder, particularly on the commercial side of parking.

Council Member Romaine echoed the same comments as Mayor Seils. Spoke on minimums and maximums concerns that is in the ordinance. Suggested to get rid of the minimums and maximums and what the impact would be with regular follow ups. In favor of section 2 alternate as recommended by Planning Bd.

Council Member Slade spoke in favor of maximums as part of climate reform. Commercial wasn't included in the Comprehensive Plan because of the balance of private business owners sharing paid for parking lots with the Town.
