PROCLOMOTION - WOMEN'S HISTORY MONTH AND INTERNATIONAL **WOMEN'S DAY**

WHEREAS, the theme for Women's History Month in March 2024, as established by the National Women's History Alliance, is "Women Who Advocate for Equity, Diversity and Inclusion," honoring "women throughout the country who understand that, for a positive future, we need to eliminate bias and discrimination entirely from our lives and institutions."; and

WHEREAS, the theme of the United Nations Observance of International Women's Day on March 8, 2024, is "Inspire Inclusion," recognizing that "when we inspire others to understand and value women's inclusion, we forge a better world."—" when women themselves are inspired to be included, there's a sense of belonging, relevance, and empowerment"; and

WHEREAS, the history of International Women's Day and Women's History Month emerged from the labor and antiwar movements of the early 20th century, with an emphasis on women's suffrage and workers' rights that later expanded to include equal pay and other fair labor practices, sexual and reproductive rights, and the prevention of gender-based violence; and

WHEREAS, International Women's Day and Women's History Month offer a reminder that all attempts to subjugate women, erode women's rights, and promote and defend gender-based violence—whether in our homes, our workplaces, or our legislatures—must be resisted; and

WHEREAS, these observances also offer an opportunity to celebrate the contributions that women of every race, class, ethnic background, and gender identity have made to the social, cultural, and economic life of the community; and

WHEREAS, women are serving in leadership roles throughout the Town of Carrboro organization, including several as department heads; and, since the election of Alderman Mary Riggsbee in 1971 and Mayor Ruth West in 1975, the people of Carrboro have been proudly electing women to local office, including currently serving Mayor Barbara Foushee and Council Member Randee Haven-O'Donnell, and

WHEREAS, a great woman poet named Nikki Giovanni once said, "Deal with yourself as an individual worthy of respect, and make everyone else deal with you the same way." and

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Barbara M Foushee, mayor of the Town of Carrboro, North Carolina, do hereby proclaim March 8, 2024, to be International Women's Day in Carrboro and the month of March 2024 to be Women's History Month in Carrboro. I encourage all residents to participate in Women's History Month events and to learn about and celebrate the lives, history, and contributions of women during this month and throughout the year.

PROCLOMOTION - TRANSIT OPERATOR APPRECIATION DAY

WHEREAS, local and regional public transit are necessities for our community; and

WHEREAS, communities across the United States observe Transit Operator Appreciation Day each year on March 18 to recognize transit operators' dedication, hard work, and the essential services they provide as they move people about by rail, bus, taxi and van to name a few and

WHEREAS, transit operators start their days before the sun rises and finish them long after the sun is set, including working weekends and on or around holidays, while many of us are spending time with family and friends; and

WHEREAS, in addition to meeting stringent safety requirements, transit operators must demonstrate customer service, patience, empathy, and understanding to create a welcoming and inclusive environment for community members and visitors; and

WHEREAS, transit operators work hard each day to help transit users access jobs, health care, school, community services, and many other personal, social, and civic opportunities; and

WHEREAS, we have been shown how vital public transit is to our communities; and how transit operators continue to work on the front lines, adapting to new work environments and safety requirements and helping transit users safely reach essential destinations while also responding to various changes in their own lives; and

WHEREAS, here in our community, Chapel Hill Transit operates the second largest transit system in North Carolina as a partnership between the Town of Carrboro, the Town of Chapel Hill, and the University of North Carolina, providing fare-free, 7-day-a-week transit service to help our communities and the university meet our transportation, sustainability, and equity goals; and

WHEREAS, in 2016, Go Triangle extended regional transit service into Carrboro and, since that time, has operated weekday service between downtown Carrboro and the Triangle region; and

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Barbara M Foushee, mayor of the Town of Carrboro, North Carolina, do hereby proclaim March 18, 2024, to be Transit Operator Appreciation Day in Carrboro. I encourage all residents and visitors to incorporate public transit into their transportation routines; to become advocates for local and regional public transit; and, most important, to thank our local and regional transit operators at every opportunity.

WHEREAS, the Town of Carrboro recognizes the urgent need to address the crisis of femicide, which disproportionately affects women; and

WHEREAS, femicide is a hate crime directed at women- whether assigned as female at birth or self-identified as female -because of their sex or gender; and

WHEREAS, femicide is a grave issue in our society, with more than five women losing their lives daily in the United States alone, constituting 70% of the total deaths of women in high-

122 123 124	income countries. Globally, the United States ranks 34th in intentional homicides of women, with a rate of 2.6 murders per 100,000 women; and
125 126 127	WHEREAS the data analysis organization Statista finds that North Carolina had the sixth highest number of homicides of women by men among all US states in 2020 and
128 129 130	WHEREAS, the lack of specific legislation recognizing femicide as a distinct crime from homicide in the United States hampers efforts to address and prevent these tragic deaths; and
131 132 133 134 135	WHEREAS, recent cases of femicides in North Carolina, such as the tragic death of Liliana Concha, underscore the imperative for legislative action to provide justice for victims and their families, enable accurate data collection and research, and serve as a deterrent against such heinous crimes; and
136 137 138	WHEREAS , the Town of Carrboro recognizes the importance of taking proactive measures to address gender-based violence and promote the safety and well-being of all residents; and,

FOLLOW-UP TO FY 2022-2023 AUDIT FINDING

The purpose of this agenda item is to provide a response letter for planned corrective actions relating to the audit findings presented to Council on January 9, 2024.

A motion was made by Council Member Haven-O'Donnell, seconded by Council Member Nowell to approve the following resolution:

RESOLUTION FOR CORRECTIVE ACTION PLAN TO CORRECT INTERNAL CONTROL WEAKNESSES FOR FINANCIAL REPORTING AND BUDGET VIOATION FOR FY 2022-2023

WHEREAS, the Town Council has received a presentation of the Financial Statements and Independent Audit for the Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 2023, from independent auditors, FORVIS, LLP; and,

WHEREAS, the Independent Auditors, FORVIS, LLP, has provided a favorable opinion for the Town's Annual Comprehensive Financial Statements; and,

WHEREAS, the Independent Auditors identified a material weakness in internal controls for financial reporting and identified a budget violation where an over expenditure was identified in FY 2022-2023; and,

WHEREAS, this material weakness caused an inaccurate reconciliation of certain asset and liability accounts which required material adjusting journal entries during the audit process to correct these improperly reported balances; and,

WHEREAS, it is important that financial reporting be accurate and complete to disclose the financial condition of the Town and for management decision making; and,

WHEREAS, 20 NCAC 03 .0508 requires the governing body to develop a "Response to the Auditor's Findings, Recommendations, and Fiscal Matters" (Response) signed by a majority of the members of the governing body; and submit such Response to the Secretary of the Local Government Commission within 60 days after the presentation.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOVLED by the Town Council of the Town of Carrboro, North Carolina that:

- 1. The Finance Director position has been backfilled and Finance Department is fully staffed.
- 2. New role of Comptroller has been established to strategically govern and lead the accounting process, including approving all journal entries input by Staff Accountant and Accounting Technician.
 - a. Monthly Balance Sheet account reconciliation.
 - c. Continually monitor unassigned fund balance goal of 22.5-35.0%.

- d. Simplify fund reporting process by aggregating smaller funds into grouped reporting as pursuant to North Caolina Law.
 - e. Review all balance sheet accounts, across funds.
 - f. Review and assess system processes for capital assets, accounts receivable and accounts payable.
 - g. Develop, with finance staff, procedures for reconciliations of all balance sheet accounts across funds to ensure that trial balances do not contain errors.
 - h. Recommend necessary training for accounting staff.

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311 4. The above tasks in Item #3 above are to be completed no later than May 31, 2024.

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- 5. Over-expenditures that occurred in the shared transportation fund were the result of the failure to properly budget for and anticipate the annual true-up described in the joint agreement with the Town of Chapel Hill. The multi-year agreement is contracted in the final month of the fiscal year to cover the next fiscal year. The budget in Fiscal Year 2022-2023 carried over the standard monthly payment and was not updated to reflect terms of the new contract, executed 6/24/2023. Although the 2022-2023 FY budget did account for potential unknown increased operating costs compared to the prior fiscal year, it was not enough to cover the operating cost increase outlined in the new contract. Therefore, a one-time true-up of \$123,568.20 was accrued as an accounts payable on 6/30/2023, resulting in a budget expenditure overage and budget violation identified in October, 2023. Additionally, the Transportation Fund has minimal annual activity other than this obligation from the Town and was not able to initiate a staff-level reclass of dollars to cover the unforeseen expense, thus requiring a Council approved Budget Amendment. The Finance
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- 325 Department has instituted various budgetary review processes and is now fully staffed to prevent 326 future occurrences, described in item (3) above.

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328 6. The Finance Director shall report to the Town Council on the outcomes of the above by 329 September 19, 2024.

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331 7. A copy of this resolution shall be provided to the Town's Finance Director within five days of 332 adoption.

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416	PUBLIC PARKING UPDATE PRESENTATION AND DISCUSSION
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418	To provide an update presentation on the status of public parking enforcement and gather
419	feedback regarding paid parking.
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421	Jon Hartman-Brown, Economic Development Director, gave a presentation with background, the
422	updating findings from the parking study, and proposed recommendations.
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424 425 426	Conversation between Council Members and Jon Hartman-Brown began about parking preferences, to include a possible window of initial free parking, making all spots equitable (same cost), and looking into long-term costs.		
427 428 429 430 431	Conversation between Council Members and Jon Hartman-Brown ensued about the signs to include size, color, and logos, and the need for the signs to be consistent with Chapel Hill to be as obvious as possible.		
431 432 433 434 435	Council Members and Jon Hartman-Brown discussed the need for inclusiveness to be as welcome as possible. Need data to see who is impacted and how. And the need for bike sharing at the library to encourage people to park in the deck.		
436 437 438 439	Conversation between Council Members and Jon Hartman-Brown followed about the difference between private and public parking. Also discussed the ADA fine and changing it to state average before implementing paid parking.		
440 441 442 443 444 445	Council Members and Jon Hartman-Brown discussed the current curb stopper information and how that would impact if they switched to paid parking, but software would use license plate information. Council recommended using the same software, Cardinal, as Chapel Hill to make it easier for residents to use. Discussed options to pay for parking: using the app, texting, or calling in.		
446 447 448 449	Conversation between Council Members and Jon Hartman-Brown continued about the possible free window to park to encourage turnover at businesses while still having parking. Council recommended ADA spots be free but encouraged the increase of the fine to \$250.		
450 451 452	Council Members and Jon Hartman-Brown discussed the sunset of the current leased parking lots, the future of them when leases come up, and the future of downtown development.		
453 454 455	Council Members and Jon Hartman-Brown came back to the signs and to see if there was still time to make changes. They also touched back on the free parking window and the need for community engagement prior to implementation.		
456 457 458 459	Council Members and Jon Hartman-Brown discussed the need for enforcement on current Town Code and what it would take for enforcement, to include one full time employee with a vehicle. Also discussed the need for software and recurring budget for it and an employee.		
460 461 462	Jon Hartman-Brown finished up the discussion with the next steps and what staff will bring back to Council with a way ahead.

468 469 470	Council Member Posada brought up there is a resolution being passed by the Governor's Advisory Council on Hispanic and Latino Affairs about the incidences going on across the State.		
471 472 473 474	Council Member Fray brought up the board consolidation process and the Council's decision to stop all new appointments to all the boards, but the Board of Adjustment will need new appointments.		
475 476 477	Nick Herman, Town Attorney, discussed that it is important, especially for the Board of Adjustment, to elect new members.
