RESOLUTION – NATIONAL MENTORING MONTH

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This resolution was presented to Sonia Frischemeier with Mentor NC.

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A motion was made by Council Member Foushee, seconded by Council Member Haven-O'Donnell, to approve the following resolution:

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NATIONAL MENTORING RESOLUTION

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WHEREAS, January 2021 will mark the 19th anniversary of National Mentoring Month, an annual campaign to focus attention on the need for mentors, as well as how each of us can work

together to increase the number of mentors to help ensure positive outcomes for our young people; and,

WHEREAS, the Town of Carrboro honors volunteer mentors who support young people by showing up for them and demonstrating their commitment to helping them thrive; and,

WHEREAS, mentoring programs such as MENTOR North Carolina and Blue Ribbon Mentor Advocate make our communities and our state stronger by driving meaningful relationships that increase social capital for young people and provide invaluable support networks; and,

WHEREAS, during the COVID-19 pandemic, mentoring programs have stepped up to fill gaps for young people and families, connecting them with resources and ensuring that mentoring relationships continue virtually to ensure social connection despite physical distancing; and,

WHEREAS, mentoring plays a pivotal role in career exploration and supports workplace skills by helping young people set career goals, equipping mentors with the skills needed to support the professional growth of young people, and driving positive outcomes for young people and businesses; and,

WHEREAS, quality mentoring promotes healthy relationships and communication, self-esteem, emotional growth and well-being for young people; and,

WHEREAS, students who meet regularly with their mentors are more than 52 percent less likely than their peers to skip a day of school, and youth who face an opportunity gap and have a mentor are 55 percent more likely to be enrolled in college than those who without a mentor; and,

WHEREAS, youth who meet regularly with their mentors are 46 percent less likely than their peers to start using drugs and 27 percent less likely to start drinking; and,

WHEREAS, almost half of adults today report having a mentor in their youth and those rates appear to have been rising steadily over the past several decades, and,

WHEREAS, National Mentoring Month is the time of year to celebrate and promote mentors, mentees and the mentoring movement.

 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Carrboro Town Council does hereby proclaim January 2021 as National Mentoring Month in the Town of Carrboro, and encourages members of the community to elevate and encourage mentoring throughout our town, county, state, and nation for the sake of our younger generations and the future.

362	WHEREAS, on March 23, 2016, S.L. 2016-3 (commonly known as "House Bill 2") established
363	new statewide standards for what constitutes discriminatory practice in employment and public
364	accommodations; omitted sexual orientation, gender identity and expression, and other
365	categories from the statewide list of categories protected from discrimination; and appeared to
366 367	preempt local governments from offering these protections to their residents; and
368	WHEREAS, on March 26, 2016, the Carrboro Town Council approved a resolution calling for
369	the repeal of S.L. 2016-3 and announced its intention to seek opportunities to adopt appropriate
370 371	local ordinances to advance equal protection and nondiscrimination; and
372	WHEREAS, on March 30, 2017, S.L. 2017-4 repealed S.L. 2016-3 and, in Section 3 of the act,
373	preempted local governments from enacting or amending ordinances regulating private

398	Section 8-81 Definitions.
399	The following definitions apply to this Article:
400 401 402 403	(1) "Discrimination" means any difference in treatment based on race, natural hair or hairstyles ethnicity, creed, color, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression, national origin or ancestry, marital or familial status, pregnancy, veteran status, religious belief or non-belief, age or disability.
404 405	(2) "Employer" includes any person employing one or more persons within the Town of Carrbord and any person acting in the interest of an employer, directly or indirectly.
406 407 408 409	(3) "Gender identity or expression" means having or being perceived as having gender-related identity, expression, appearance, or behavior, whether or not that identity, expression appearance, or behavior is different from that traditionally associated with the sex assigned to that individual at birth.
410 411 412	(4) "Person" includes one or more individuals, partnerships, associations, organizations, corporations, legal representatives, unincorporated organizations, fiduciaries, and other organized groups of persons.
413 414 415 416	(5) "Place of public accommodation" includes, but is not limited to, any place, facility, store, other establishment, hotel, or motel, which supplies goods or services on the premises to the public or which solicits or accepts the patronage or trade of any person.
417 418	(6) "Pregnancy" includes, but is not limited to, pregnancy, childbirth, or any medical condition related to pregnancy or childbirth.
419 420	Section 8-82 Discrimination in Places of Public Accommodations Prohibited.
421 422	It shall be unlawful for any proprietor or their employer, keeper, or manager in a place of public accommodation to deny any person, except for reasons applicable alike to all

persons, regardless of race, natural hair or hairstyles, ethnicity, creed, color, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression, national origin or ancestry, marital or familial status, pregnancy, veteran status, religious belief or non-belief, age, or disability the full enjoyment of the accommodations, advantages, facilities or privileges thereof.

Section 8-83 Discrimination in Employment Prohibited.

It shall be unlawful for any employer, because of the race, natural hair or hairstyles, ethnicity, creed, color, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression, national origin or ancestry, marital or familial status, pregnancy, veteran status, religious belief or non-belief, age, or disability of any person to refuse to hire or otherwise discriminate against that person with respect to hire, tenure, conditions, or privileges of employment, or any matter directly or indirectly related to employment.

Section 8-84 Penalties and Enforcement.

(a) Any person, firm, or corporation violating any provisions of this Article shall, under G.S. 14-4(a), be guilty of a Class 3 misdemeanor and shall be fined five hundred dollars (\$500.00). Each and every day during which such discrimination continues shall be deemed a separate offense.

(b) In addition to, or in lieu of the remedy provided in subsection (a), any person, firm, or corporation violating any provisions of this Article may be subject to an enforcement action brought by the Town under G.S. 160A-175(d) and (e) for an appropriate equitable remedy, including but not limited to a mandatory or prohibitory injunction commanding the defendant to correct the conduct prohibited under this Article.
